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A message from our Chair

Welcome

A year like no other, courtesy of the pandemic, but also full of uplifting moments, courage, commitment and creativity.

Creative

Each year a theme threads our work together. For 2020 it was Justice - social justice, lawful justice, honesty and being treated fairly - developed further with 2021's theme of exploring 'What it means to be human'. In January 2020 performances of *The Railway Children* saw our highest live audiences ever; our film *See No Evil* with associated school workshops were in full swing and then, in March, as we started preparations for *Animal Farm*, everything was abruptly stopped.

Blue Apple didn't falter but gulped, made a reality of our own sense of justice and launched into virtual sessions, an astonishing and commendable feat by staff, freelancers, trustees and performers. Watch our *Pinocchia* on YouTube (December 2020) to see every actor performing their socks off. Enjoy their achievement and read the programme notes to get an inkling of the complexities overcome and the commitment shown.

As I write (September), the first whole-cast, in-person, inside rehearsals since March 2020 are underway and popping with impressive ideas! What better theme for this new season than 'Ambition'? Make a note in your diaries for the *Wizard of Oz* 7-9 Jan and Macbeth in the summer to see and enjoy what Blue Apple performers offer.



Challenges

We all faced challenges during 2020/21; since virtual sessions did not suit everyone, understandably participant numbers fell so we consolidated the weekly programme.

Staff continued to work remotely throughout, showing amazing versatility and resilience with access to neither office nor rehearsal space. Likewise, trustees demonstrated their calibre. I can honestly guarantee that future new staff, volunteers, freelancers, trustees and of course future performers are assured of a warm welcome.

Finance is a perennial concern in the arts world, never more so than during the pandemic. So it is good to report some grant successes. Next year we aim to increase donations from friends and supporters to continue our exciting work.

Courage

New ventures included a Youth Summer School, run virtually in 2020. We hope that these younger performers will graduate onto Blue Apple's adult groups. Even during lockdown Blue Apple built on existing contacts and forged new international links, participating in digital sessions with Art Stream and Barrier-Free Theatre (USA); broadcasting our contribution to World Down Syndrome Day with some American actors with Downs; and a contribution from Czech theatre company Divadlo Aldente.

In December 2020 we also spoke at an international conference on Outsider Art which was run (digitally) out of Athens.

Finale

This is my final entry to the Annual Review as I step down in October, bowing out after seven years as Chair and nine as a Trustee. It truly has been a privilege to have been Chair of this exciting and fun theatre company. Blue Apple performers are destined for many great accolades yet to come, supported by a wonderful team of professional staff, volunteer helpers and keen supporters. Who wouldn't want to be a supporter of those who are following their dreams? Certainly I will long remain loyal.

Reflections from the Artistic Director

Reflections from Artistic Director, Richard Conlon

History will judge the year we have just been through as one of the most challenging for the charitable and arts sectors;


I am proud to say that we not only survived but we made some worthwhile art, developed new connections and learned new skills over a tricky 12 months.

Our primary drive in the early days of the pandemic was the wellbeing of our participants – staying connected and combatting isolation was a higher priority than dancing, singing or acting.

Slowly but very surely our participants got to grips with a totally new technology and were soon engaging through a screen instead of in a rehearsal room – new skills learned.

Our first fully digital (but still delivered live) show, *Pinocchia*, was watched by many more people than would have seen a theatre-piece, and from further afield too.

The past year taught us a lot which maybe should have been obvious to us on all sorts of levels. At Blue Apple we certainly learned that our community of like-minded people are not necessarily just in our town, county or region but spread across the globe – the digital approach made distance melt away and brought us together with companies like ourselves in the USA and Europe – now we know how easy it



is to reach out and share our work we'll definitely be staying in touch with our new friends.

I have never been prouder of the resilience our performers showed in the year just gone – they were an inspiration. Our trustees also proved their faith in the work of the company by keeping everything moving throughout. As we close the period covered in this review we continue to explore the notion of 'being human' (after the digital-success of *Pinocchia*) with preparations for our own particular take on *Frankenstein* which will be staged and, we hope, toured internationally.

Our Impact

The impact of maintaining participation online

At a time of sudden changes for Blue Apple, we adapted and moved our groups into online sessions to ensure our members with learning disabilities could continue to safely access and enjoy all the personal benefits they get from arts activities.

Blue Apple offered live interactive sessions for each of its groups at their regular times each week. Videos and other activities were also posted on our website and YouTube channel, to help keep everyone active and connected.

For many, the sessions were the highlights of the week whilst they struggled with the isolation of lockdown life. Brothers Harry and Archie Ayling benefited from connecting with their peers during online drama and singing classes during the pandemic.

Harry and Archie Ayling from Winchester both have Fragile X Syndrome, which means they have severe to moderate learning difficulties and mild autistic behaviours. During lockdown and social distancing measures, the brothers worked on college work from home and joined in with Blue Apple's drama and singing classes on Zoom. Mum Lizzie said: "The Blue Apple classes were great."



The boys light up and find a new energy. They love to please and the positive feedback they got during the class was brilliant. If I tell them they are doing a great job they are happy, but when that praise comes from their Blue Apple teachers they visibly puff up. It also gave them something to look forward to and maintains a routine that they are used to."

Harry and Archie have been members of Blue Apple for over two years, enjoying singing classes and drama group the Special Assignments Company. When asked about the Blue Apple classes and what they liked the most, Archie said: "It makes me happy and I feel more confident." And Harry added: "I was nervous at first but then my friends supported me, pushed me to the limit and encouraged me to sing."

Mum Lizzie added: "They both love Blue Apple. It allows them to feel like an important member of a group, gives them a goal to work towards and a huge sense of pride when they have performed.

"The lockdown meant they were unable to go to college, so we were all at home, but this is a happy place for Harry and Archie. They can spend more time with their younger brother and are enjoying helping with cooking. The element they missed was being part of a peer group, the sense of importance when achieving something outside of home and the recognition of that achievement. Routine is important for them and Blue Apple's new online classes helped with this."




